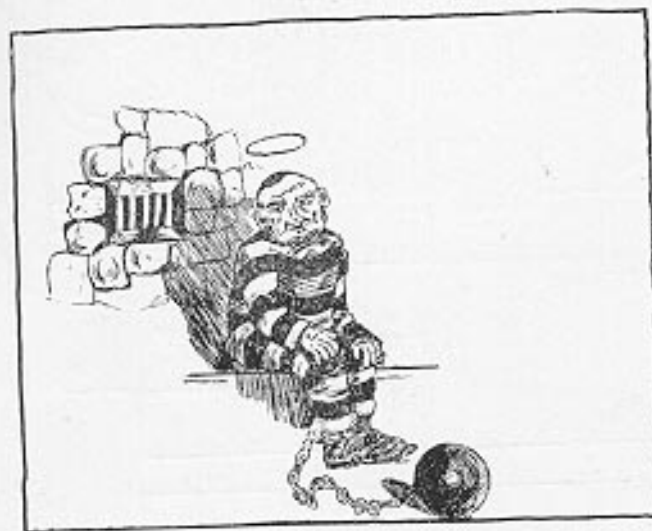
The second floor is sub-divided. On the one side of the stairway are the boys who rank next to the attic boys in

Having spoken of the boys and instructor in a general way, we may now consider each one separately:

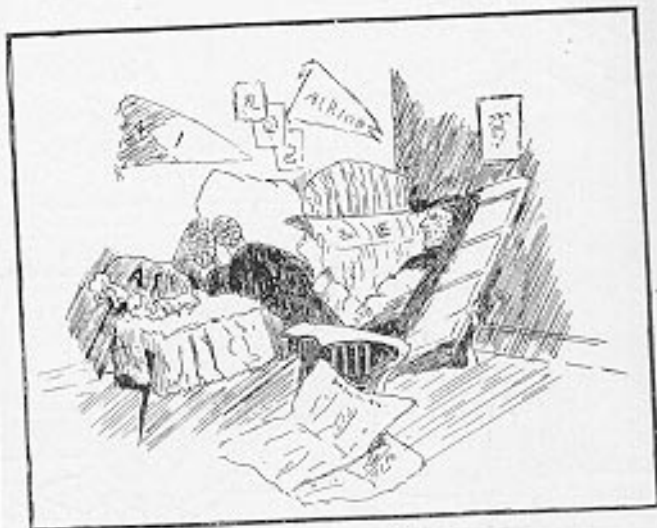
Mr. Slaughter—At 10:03 p. m., "Boys, you are three minutes late."

Ralph Kelley—Gets his lessons, becoming an expert in science, from lessons given by Prof. McPherson.

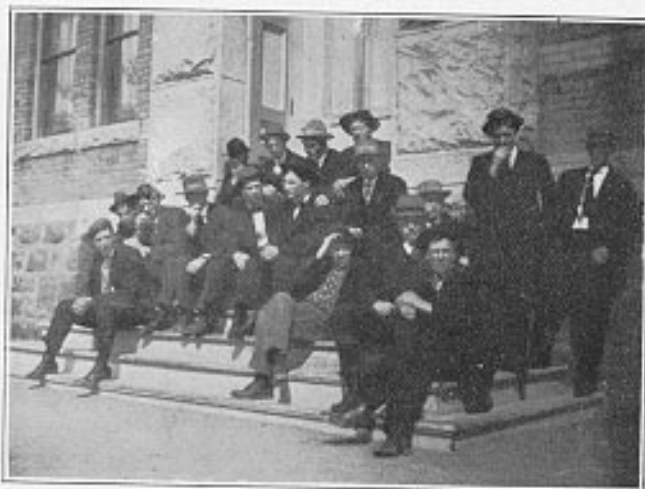
Mr. Kinney—A new man, but the management thinks that he is old enough to take care of himself. Nick name, "Theodolphus."
