But owing to the light enrollment in school during the first two months of school and to the withdrawal from school of two of the best halfbacks that ever played the game, the coach and team went through the remainder of the season with a handicap. They came out, however, with a creditable record for themselves and the school.

The "Tech" Bantams were outweighed in every game that they played during the whole season. But due to the ability of Mr. Bronson as a football coach they went through the season winning two games out of every three played and coming out with second place in both the Southern Idaho Conference and the Idaho-Utah Junior College Conference.

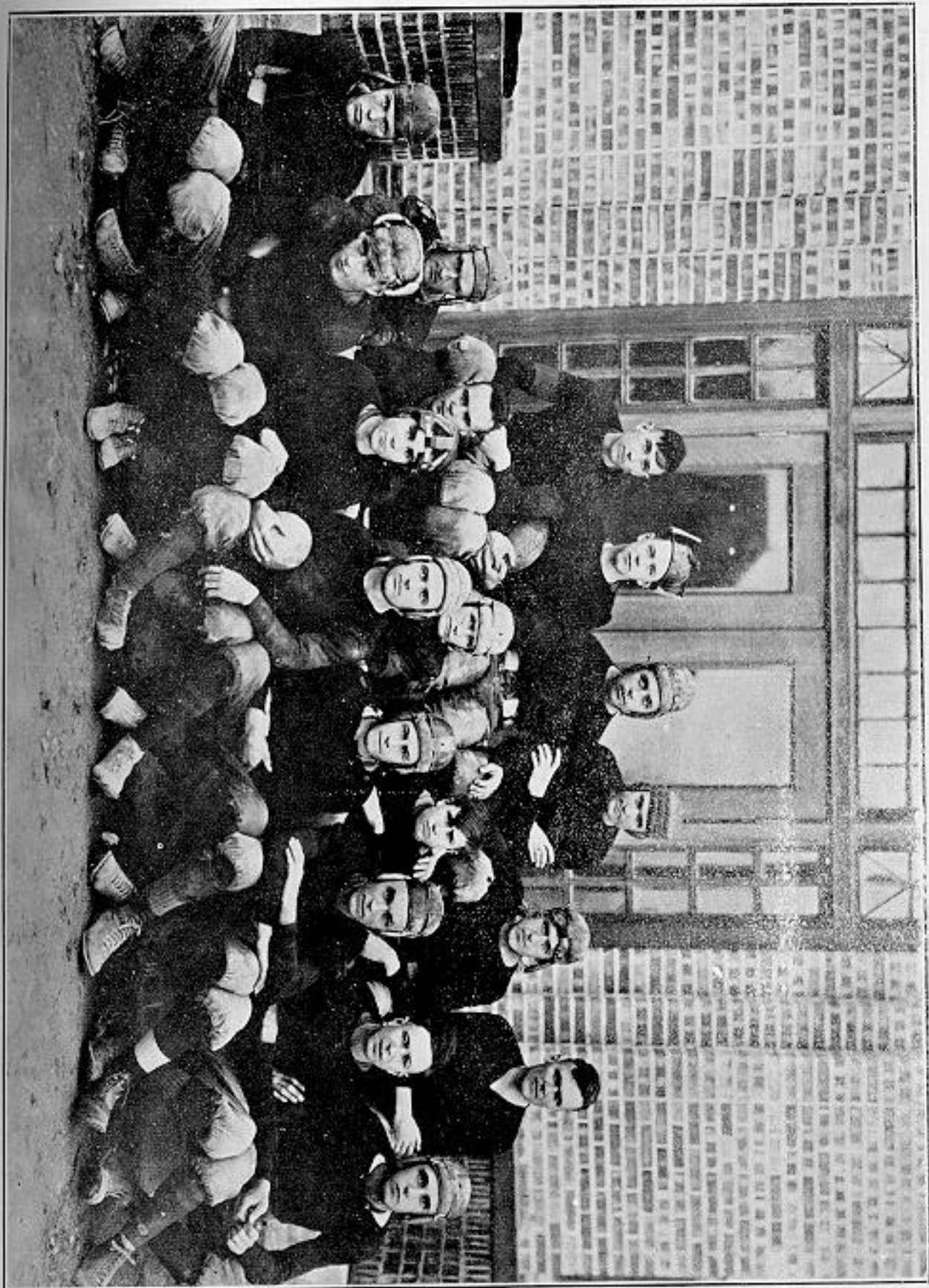
The season closed with a banquet at the Y. M. C. A. given by the Rotary Club of Pocatello.

The 1919-20 Basketball season was one of the most successful seasons the Tech has ever had. The first call for Basketball was made December 2nd and about thirty-five men appeared in suits ready for work. The inter-class series were the first games played and they were enjoyed by all. Most of the games were won by very close margins.

In the series the College Freshmen came out victors by defeating the Junior Vocationals and the Trade Classes. After the class series was finished Coach Dingle picked the men to try for the first team.

After the Christmas vacation the team was chosen and then the hard work began. Each afternoon from four to six the men reported and were given a thorough workout by the coach, and on January 23, the Albion State Normal school team came here for the first game of the Southern Idaho Conference games and our team was easily the winner with little effort expended.

Our team then started on their trip. They played Albion at Albion on February 4, and won an easy victory again. They next played Gooding College at Gooding February 5, and won by the overwhelming score of 48 to 8. The final game of the trip was against the College of Idaho at Caldwell February 6. The Tech hoopsters were again victors. The final games of the Conference were played in the Tech gym against the College of Idaho on February 14, and against Gooding College March 12. In the Conference we won every game and scored 208 points against the 105 points scored by our opponents.

## Physical Education for Women

The importance of Physical Education as a part of the daily school schedule for every girl is at last being recognized in most every section of our country. Every other Department of a school realizes that to accomplish the best results in that special phase of education each individual concerned must first be physically efficient. Physical Education then is not an end, but a means to an end.

Beginning with the Fall term of 1919 the Idaho Technical Institute requires three credits in Physical Education for graduation from the Vocational School and three credits in Physical Education for graduation from the Junior College, with the exception of a few unusual instances.

Physical Education is given as a means of raising the physical, mental and spiritual qualities of the individual; realizing that the mental efficiency is regulated by the physical and that young men and women need guidance in physical as well as mental development.

Each girl is registered in three classes of Practical Gymnastics a week. These are well-rounded classes in Physical Education, consisting of Marching Tactics, Setting Up Exercises, Apparatus Work, Indian Clubs, Wands or Dumbbells, Games or Play, Folk or Aesthetic Dancing.

On the afternoon of June 3rd is to be staged the first Spring Festival of Dances at the Idaho Technical Institute. This is to be a series of over twenty Folk and Aesthetic Dances, in costume, and held on the Tech Campus. In order that this Festival may be of more universal value to the city of Pocatello children from each of the city schools are receiving training, in one or two dances, at the Technical Institute. A great amount of enthusiasm is being displayed by each of the girls which promises to make the Festival of Dances the most interesting affair of its kind ever staged on the Tech campus.
