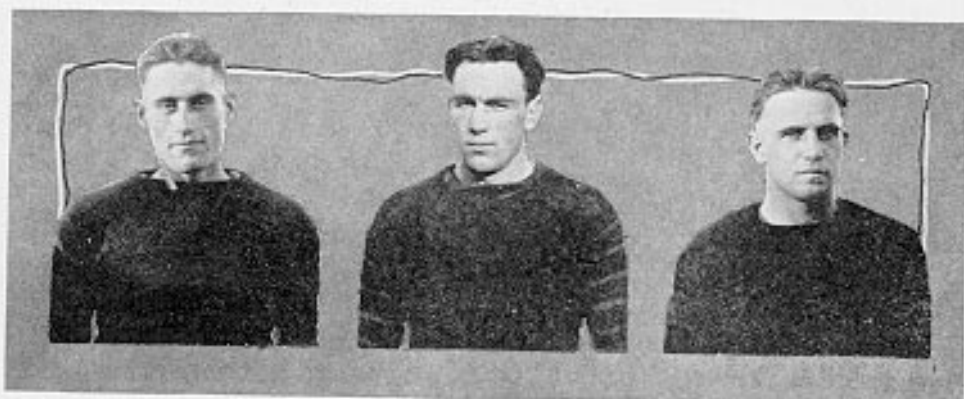
Third Year

First Year

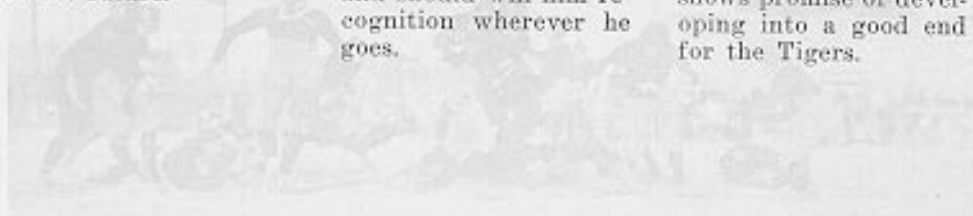
Siggie developed a great deal in his first year of football experience, and great things may be expected of him in the future.

First Year.

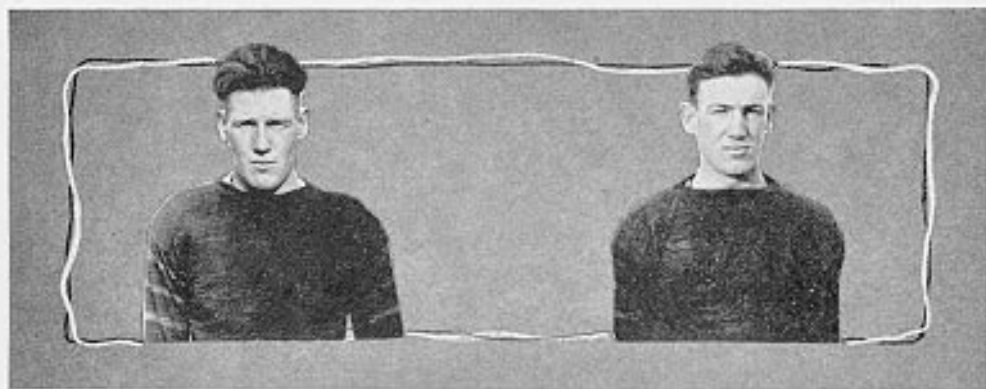
Sam was a hard working and conscientious half, and only lack of weight and experience held him out of a regular position.

First Year.

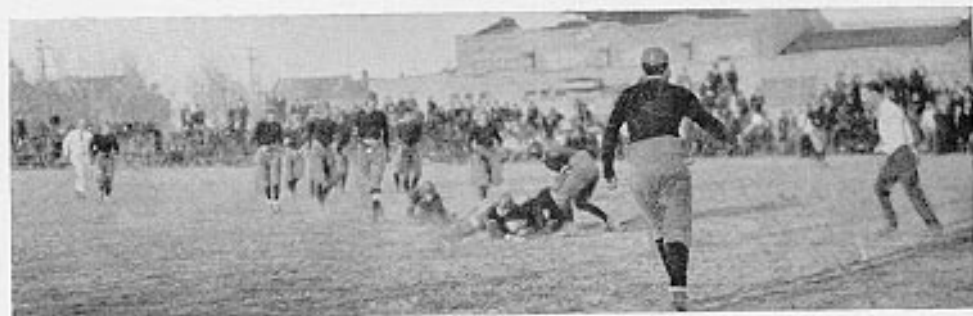
Andy was put out of the game early in the season by injuries, but will be going strong next fall.
