The team won seven out of eight games and tied the other. They scored a total of 202 points to their opponents 26, an average of 25.25 points per game for the Tigers.

COACH WICKS

Finishing an athletic season with only one setback, Coach Guy P. Wicks, new athletic mentor, piloted his teams to a record unprecedented in the history of the Southern Branch.

His football squad went through the season without a single defeat. This record was equalled only by 25 colleges in the entire country.

In the preseason basketball games the Tigers scored victories over such teams as the University of Utah. Building his team around such men as Dellinger, Mulica, Carte, Fore, and Smith, the new coach welded an aggregation of hoopsters that was practically invincible. The team downed all opponents until they were beaten once by the Ricks College Vikings.


COACH WOODARD

Under the direction of Walter A. Woodard, the newly inaugurated department of Intramural Sports had more than 75 per cent participation in its initial year. Of 511 men, 401 took part in at least one of the 17 sports.

The diversified program included cross-country, turkey run, touch football, foul throwing, basketball, ping pong, wrestling, boxing, soft ball, volleyball, dual track, track relays, all-university track meet, golf, tennis, horseshoes, and Alpha Omega, a local honor society in athletics.

Coach Woodard introduced a point system, whereby the highest scorer is awarded a bronze victory statuette trophy. Every champion is awarded a medal.


ALBION 6, TIGERS 26


The Idaho Tigers opened their football season at Albion October 5, by a smashing defeat of the Albion Teachers. Albion lost the game in the first half, their fumbles, combined with the superior punting of the Tigers, piling up an insurmountable score for the Southern Branch. In the third quarter the Teachers blocked a Tiger punt. Melvin Gruell, of the Albion eleven, carried the ball across the goal line for the only Albion touchdown of the entire game. Dellinger, Harris, Reynolds, and Price each scored for Idaho. Lyle Smith, Lester Hopkins, Don Brandon, Pete Fellis, and Russell Glenisky all played strong early season games, more than fulfilling Coach Wicks' hopes for a strong Tiger machine for the 1935 season.

RICKS COLLEGE 0, TIGERS 27

In the 1934 gridiron season the Ricks College Vikings beat the Idaho Tigers. In the 1935 season the Tigers found a bloody revenge by crushing the Viking machine, in the Tiger's second game October 11, by a score of twenty-seven to nothing. There were no scores until the second quarter when the Tigers aereal attack began clicking, Hoggan and Fellis running through for touchdowns in that period. In the third quarter, Hoggan passed again, this time to Reynolds, for the fourth score of the game.

WESTERN STATE 0, TIGERS 13

Presenting a driving offense with Dellinger, fleet Idaho half-back, setting the tempo, the Idaho Tigers defeated Western State College in an interconference game at Gunnison, Colorado, October 19. Although slightly hampered by the high altitude, the Idaho team turned in a performance against their Rocky Mountain Conference opponents which clearly showed their superiority.

Idaho gained most of her yardage through battering off-tackle smashes. With Dellinger leading the
attack, ably assisted by the bullet-like passes of
Hoggan and the fleet end runs of Hopkins, the
Tigers marched twice in the first quarter to the
Bobcat's one-yard line, but were held each time for
downs. But gathering their strength, the Tigers
marched down the field early in the second quarter
to score. Dellinger carried the ball on seven consecutive plays to garner this first touchdown.

The Bobcats, held powerless by the sterling defensive play of Hetland, Brooks, Fellis, Lacy, and Twitchell, found it impossible to score throughout the entire game. Their own excellent defense held the Tigers from scoring further until the fourth quarter, when Dellinger again crossed the line.

A squad of twenty-two men made the trip, accompanied by Coach Wicks and Athletic Manager Hayden Stites. Men starting the game were Fellis, Hetland, Thompson, Twitchell, Brooks, Shaw, Lacy, Reynolds, Dellinger, Hoggan and Engle.

COLLEGE OF IDAHO 7, TIGERS 37

Intercepting passes at random and smashing their opponents' line to shreds, the Tigers completely outclassed the College of Idaho Coyotes at Twin Falls on October 26, to run wild in the second half and chalk up a crushing victory.


From the starting gun the Tigers made it evident they were out for blood. When their opening drive bogged down short of the goal, Willis Reynolds, quarterback, dropkicked the ball squarely between the bars for the first three points of the Tigers' score. But the Coyotes retaliated in the second quarter when left-handed Tommy Gill tossed a long pass to Swan, who ran across for the touchdown. The Tigers came back like wildcats. So fierce were their ripping line smashes that they gained yardage by brute force alone, and climaxed the drive with Hoggan going over for the score.


The Idaho team smashed over four touchdowns in the last half to completely banish from every mind any question as to their superiority. Hoggan passed to Fellis for the first; Brandon ripped the Coyote line to shreds for the second; Dellinger chalked up the third on a long, beautiful run; and Brandon again bucked the line for the fourth, and last, touchdown of the period.

The most outstanding men for Idaho were Hoggan, Brandon, Dellinger, Twitchell, Reynolds, Fellis, and Lacy.

The Branch made 18 first downs to seven for the College, and gained 324 yards to 227 for the Coyotes.

MONTANA MINES 0, TIGERS 60

A scant crowd of 200 shivering fans watched the Tigers run wild over Montana Mines on November 2. Playing on a snow covered field in weather below freezing, the Idaho team went over, under, around, and through their lighter opponents to gather 60 points, holding the Mines scoreless.

The Tiger second team played the entire first three quarters of the game, and gave an exceptionally good account of themselves. Hopkins scored first on an off tackle slant, outrunning the entire Ore Digger team on the slippery field. A pass, Hopkins to Wilson, surprised the Mines, and netted the second Tiger score. Brandon went on a spree, returning a punt through the entire Ore Digger team and then converted around end for the third Idaho score.

The second team scored once in the third quarter against the stiffened Ore Digger defense when Rowe, pushing along the frozen slush, bucked the ball over. At this point in the game the entire first team relieved their understudies, and immediately turned the game into a rout. Dellinger scored on a long end run, with Reynolds dropkicking the point; Twitchell intercepted an Ore Digger pass and ran half the length of the field for a touchdown, Reynolds again kicking the point; Hoggan took a lateral from Dellinger for another score; Lacy counted on a pass from Hoggan; and Hoggan again passed, this time to Lacy, who lateralled to DeJulis for the last points,

MONTANA STATE 7, TIGERS 7




Two sudden scoring thrusts in the first period of the Armistice Day battle packed all the point-getting into the opening part of the encounter, after which the Bobcats and the Tigers settled down to three more quarters of profitless football.

At the first it looked as if the game was going to be all Tiger, for Hoggan passed to Fellis, who outraced the fleetest of the Bobcats, early in the first quarter. Reynolds dropkicked the point with his always-dependable toe. The Idaho fans' glee was short lived, for soon afterward, Oliver, Bobcat right end, took the ball over the Idaho line for a score. Taylor tied the score with a kick. During most of the remaining time the fans witnessed a battle of toes-a punting duel between Hoggan and Taylor, with Hoggan being far superior. It was this superiority which kept the score as it was, for time after time Hoggan sent 60-yard punts soaring up the field to save the Tigers' skins. Once in the third quarter, with Taylor and Vavich carrying the brunt of the Bobcat attack, Montana advanced to the Tiger nine-yard line where they lost the ball on downs. Hoggan saved the day when he sent a punt from behind his own goal line to the Montana 46.

The visitors made 13 first downs to 10 for Idaho, and 204 yards to 119 for the local crew. In punting, Idaho averaged 49 yards to 37½ for Montana.

Fellis, Blakely, Thompson, Twitchell, Brooks, Shaw, Lacy, Reynolds, Dellinger, Engle, and Hoggan made up the starting line.





BOISE JUNIOR COLLEGE 6, TIGERS 19

In the next to the last game of the season, the Idaho Tigers took their sixth victory November 16, by winning from the Boise Junior College Broncos at Boise.
