# Football

The opening game of the season saw a strong Utah State team defeat the Bengals at Logan, 47-0. This game developed enough experience in the team to drag a 19-18 decision from Carlsbad College of California. At Compton a strong eleven rapped out a 37-0 over the locals but the following week saw the Orange and Black squeezing a 6-0 from Boise Junior College.

A sensational passing attack by Weber in late minutes caused the Bengals' third and last defeat of the year, 20-12. Wins over Albion and College of Idaho by scores of 6-0 and 26-18, respectively, led up to the hardest game of the year. This game was with Western State of Colorado. The locals held a six point lead until the last minutes when Western State power finally knotted the score at 6-6 and that is how it was at the final gun.

The entire Bengal squad looks like a mighty impressive group, as was evidenced by wins against teams favored 3 to 1.

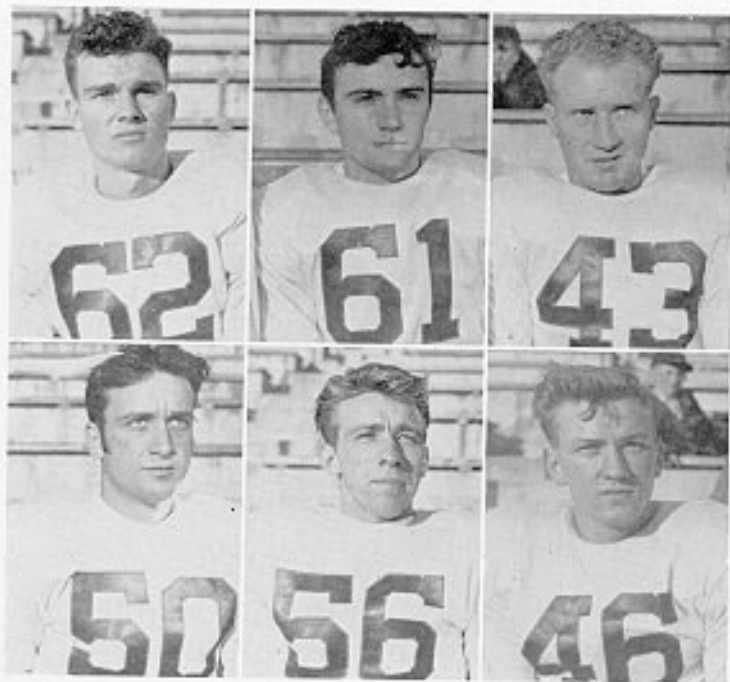


# Football

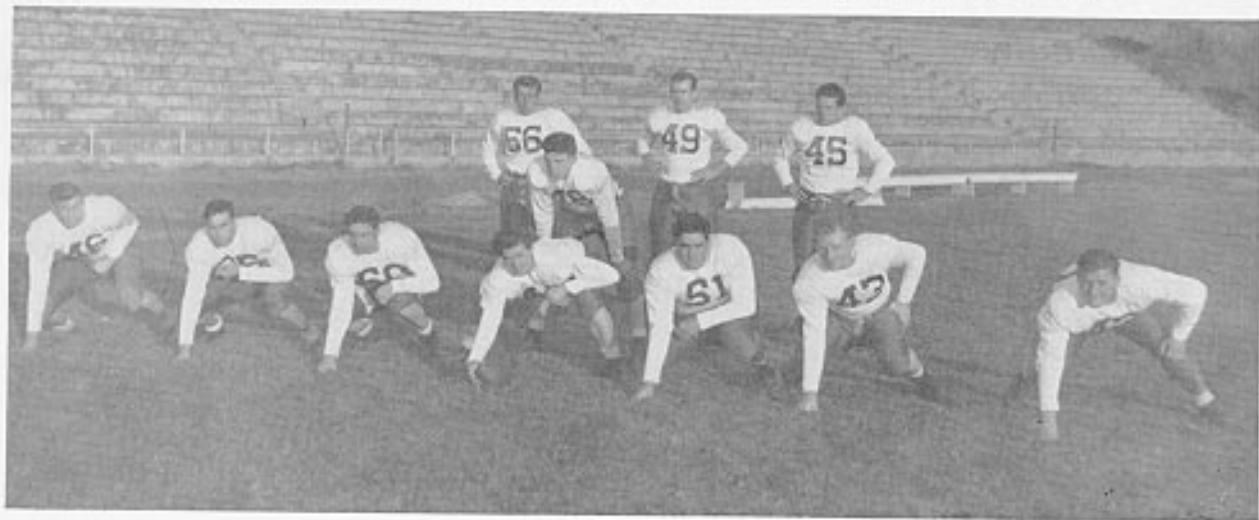
